
Push for Better Releases

Most avid offshore anglers have heard a lot of chatter about venting tools, descending devices and maybe even Return 'Em Right over the last couple of years. Return 'Em Right is a program that launched in May of 2022 to provide anglers with free training and release gear to improve survival of reef fish, such as snapper and grouper, that are suffering from barotrauma. Barotrauma is a pressure-related injury that fish experience when reeled from depth. As a fish is pulled to the surface, gasses expand internally and displace organs often leaving them bloated and unable to return to depth on their own.








Gear Use Survey

- 93% extremely satisfied with package of gear (n=3,191)
- 83% prefer descending, while 14% prefer venting (n=2,348)
 - 71% SeaQualizer
 - 12% SeaYaLater
- 94% reported having no issues with the devices (n=2,709)
- 52% were extremely likely to buy them on their own, while 24% already had (n=1,174)





3 to 5lb. 5lb is good for large fish like 25+lb grouper

Depredation Perception

THE BAD: No question we had a big shark grab some of our larger grouper on the way down. Quite upsetting when you're returning a 24" grouper only to have it eaten on the way down. Not sure but our deciding device may have been damaged. I'll check it out today.

- Were you losing a lot of fish to sharks on the way up? In my experience, sharks are far more likely to grab fish on the way up when they are struggling and fighting. Additionally, are you sure they were sharks? I'm surprised you wouldn't have lost the device if this was happening a couple of times.

Not sure they were sharks but each instance(2 or 3) was on the way down and the conventional reel spool started spinning 3x my drop rate. We were decending 24" red grouper so whatever was grabbing them was large.

When the reel speeds up significantly, that is when I know it popped off and is good to reel back up. The change in speed is significantly more noticeable the bigger the fish is on the device, as the speed of descent changes more.

I think you nailed it. We were in 105 ft. and I had the device set to 50. Your explanation fits perfectly.

Any chance of getting a second equalizer got sharked and lost my release rig

We released 4 fish that day sent down a huge margate which got hit and the shark was pulling drag and took the whole rig weight and all we have probably released well over 200 fish with no issues You are doing a great thing with your project saving unnecessary fish loss

Well, it was bound to happen! Was in the process of using the SeaQualizer to release a fish and the tax man showed up! It cut me off and took my whole setup, SeaQualizer and 3lb weight! Is there any way to get a replacement? I still have the fish saver device, but it doesn't work for some types of fish (like trigger fish), and I'm using a make-shift weight at the moment.

Thank you sir! I appreciate that! Yes, been using it almost a year and have grown quite fond of using it. They both work great, not sure how we've done without them all these years. Since this happened, I've been thinking of using wire in the setup to hopefully prevent this from happening again. Will have to see how to improve it. Again, I sure do appreciate it.


